

BIBLE STUDY LESSONS ON CHRISTIAN LIVING SUBJECT: BY HIS STRIPES SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 53:1-5 MEMORY VERSE: 1Peter 2:24-25

Isaiah 53:1-5 "Who has believed our report? And to whom is the arm of the LORD revealed? For he shall grow up before him as a tender plant, and as a root out of a dry ground: he has no form nor beauty; and when we shall see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him. He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we did not regard or value him. Surely he has endured our grief, and carried our sorrows: yet we did considered him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the punishment of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed.

DISCUSSION

I had a recent conversation with a pastor about a medical condition of which I am being treated. When hearing me speak about my condition, he immediately responded with Isaiah 53:5, as a declaration of my physical healing. We continued to talk and he often times mentioned scripture can only be understood when taken into context.

Therefore, would it be appropriate to use the above scripture as a doctrine and declaration that we are all healed of any and all medical conditions? If we look into the context of the scripture, it

does not refer to healing of the body per se. But it does speak to the issue of why Messiah would suffer and die for the sins of the world.

First, "he was despised and rejected by men"; "we hid our faces from him"; or "we esteemed him not". This portion of scripture speaks to the declaration Jesus made while on the cross: "why have you forsaken me?"

Secondly, "he grew up as a tender plant, and as a root out of dry ground"; or "when we see him there is no beauty that we show desire him". It is known that the gospel of Jesus Christ is not a well received message, though it is preached and taught around the world. People are just not interested in what scripture states concerning the works of Jesus Christ and the promise of eternal life. For a majority of individuals their interests focus on what can be gained in this life only.

Third, "he has borne our grief, and carried our sorrows"; "we was wounded for our iniquities" or "the chastisement of our peace was upon him". From scripture we read how Jesus was born into the world and lived as a man known as the Son of God. For many who believed in him, thought of him as Savior of the world. He lived a modest life as a carpenter's son; traveled by foot or mule; worshipped according to Jewish traditions; performed many miracles of healing, raising the dead and even showed power over nature.

Yet it was the teachings and preaching of Jesus that resulted in his being crucified by the Romans. The Jews were determined to remove his influence from their culture as it was a threat to established norms. The Jewish civil and religious leaders did not recognize Jesus as the promised Messiah who would deliver them from the power of their enemy (the Devil).

Fourth, "with his stripes we are healed" refers to the payment due for sin. The wages of sin is death. Death having fallen upon all men, therefore "all have sinned and come short of the glory of God.

Now, healing is a blessed benefit of faith in Christ Jesus, who provides gifts to men for that purpose, but this scripture does not necessarily lead us to this conclusion. We must look to other verses of scripture for guidance on the matter. It is inappropriate to use this particular scripture in that way. pastor Remember. the stated interpretation is dependent upon context (which) he has missed. There is no contextual meaning which we can conclude this scripture refers specifically to physical healing.

CONCLUSION

If we want to properly interpret this portion of scripture we should focus upon how Jesus' death paid the price for our sins. Believing and receiving him as Lord and savior who is our protection from the coming judgment and all he wants is for us to be with him in the end.
